30 years of leadership focus of fall conference

“Leadership 1974-2004: A 30-Year Perspective,” is the theme of the 2004 AAWCC Annual Conference, set for Nov. 18-19 at the Sheraton Portland Airport Hotel.

Speakers include Dr. Cindy Miles, vice president of Learning and Academic Affairs, Community College of Denver, who will speak on the topic “Women’s Ways of Leading.”

Also featured will be Diana Abu Jaber, author and University of Miami faculty, whose topic will be “Writing Women’s

Lives.”

Abu-Jaber’s new novel “Crescent” won a National Endowment for the Arts award and was named a Notable Book of the Year by the Christian Science Monitor.

Her work has appeared in such publications as Good Housekeeping, Ms., Salon, Gourmet, The New York Times, and The Nation, and she is frequently featured on National Public Radio.

Her first novel, “Arabian Jazz,” won the Oregon Book Award. She also was named one of the Top Women Writers of 2003

by Vanity Fair Magazine.

She is now an associate professor in the creative writing program at the University of Miami.

“Lessons in Leadership: Then and Now” will be presented by

Participants were presented with tools for communicating in difficult situations and were given the opportunity to observe and participate in role plays using the information.
