## Summer session set for seashore

## Annual OILDset for June 14-17

The Oregon Institute for Leadership Development is a unique opportunity for women from Oregon community colleges to learn about developing and enhancing their leadership skills.

The 13th annual OILD will be held at the Silver Falls Conference Center, June 14-17, 2004.

A select group of women, each nominated by her college, will come together to gain insight on work styles, to consider community college issues, and to reflect on professional ethics, personal value systems, gender dynamics and leadership.

Participants also will hear women in community college leadership roles — college presidents, deans, faculty, support staff — share their stories of personal and professional growth.

The investment in this development opportunity benefits colleges as well as the individual. Many who have attended OILD have subsequently assumed leadership roles at their institutions.

Last year, 22 women participated in OILD. They and all other AAWCC members are invited to join their OILD and National Institute for Leadership Development sisters at the 2004 Leader's Reception, 6 p.m. Wednesday, June 16, at Silver Falls.

Dr. Schuette's previous positions include superintendent of the Gresham Barlow School District, dean of Distance and Continuing Education, and director of Portland Area Programs for Oregon State University.

She served as interim commissioner of Oregon Community Colleges, executive vice president of Mt. Hood Community College, and dean of Humanities, Sciences, and Learning Assistance at Chemeketa Community College.

She also served as Chemeketa's director of Instructional Services and Learning
