Mt. Hood CC receives grant

The Oregon Chapter of AAWCC has a grants program, which makes cash grants available to local chapters and women's networks. The purpose of the grant program is to help support activities on individual campuses that carry out the mission of Oregon AAWCC—"to inspire, champion, and celebrate the talents within each of us."

In January 2003, the Mt. Hood Community College AAWCC received a \$150 chapter grant. They are creating a series of events during lunch over the next five months called "Women Mentoring Women." Each event will feature one of the female administrators at MHCC. The purpose is to create a support system and sense of community among women regardless of position and to create a mentoring program. We wish them great success with this campus activity and encourage other chapters to apply for a chapter grant for their community college.

The limit of the grant is \$150 per application. Funds can be used for speakers, rent space, materials, refreshments, etc. The activity that this grant program supports should be consistent with the mission of Oregon AAWCC and available to a wide range of campus colleagues.

Others harbor stereotypes that comics are for 12-year-old boys or strange, older men. Women frequently feel isolated from the medium, as so many of the mainstream, "super hero" books depict women's bodies in ridiculously disproportionate and subjectively sexualized ways. The discussion was lively and heated at times, but the audience left enlightened and interested in the vast array of subject matter and limitless expression within the medium. Angela McMahon, Webmaster, Ex-Officio Member



2. Equity is promoted through AAWCC's efforts to improve access to
 - educational opportunities
 - employment at all levels
 - policy-making and decision-making forums.
 3. Equity issues may include career upward-mobility, comparable pay for comparable work, increased involvement of women in governing bodies, and appropriate support services for adult women enrolled and/or employed in two-year colleges.
 4. Commitment to equity must be matched by an equally strong commitment to educational and professional excellence.
 5. Excellence is promoted through AAWCC's efforts to:
 - encourage and recognize educational achievement and professional endeavors
 - provide opportunities for professional development
 - develop linkages and disseminate information pertaining to specific concerns
 6. Both equity and excellence may be enhanced through a strong and effective network of women in community, junior and technical colleges – a network where a purposeful focus on tasks, issues, and achievements is continually matched by a sensitive concern for people.
